

MCKINLEY COUNTY RECEIVES AWARD

The McKinley County Rural Addressing Department was selected to receive a second place award in the "Take Pride in America/Take Pride in New Mexico" state competition. The award was given to the McKinley County Rural Addressing Department for their work with the Bureau of Land Management as a partner in the establishment of the Automation Outreach Program. Their nomination is also being considered for national recognition by the Department of the Interior. The award was given at the Annual Governor's Community Achievement awards ceremony held on May 31, 1991.

The Automation Outreach Program was established by the BLM to help identify what data themes in their Land Information System would be of value to local governments. As a partner in this program, McKinley County can access data that resides on the BLM computer in Farmington that deals with land ownership, special management areas, transportation, and streams.

Specific objectives for the program as outlined in the



agreement between McKinley County and the BLM includes the evaluation and documentation of the following:

- ► Data collection techniques.
- ► Electronic communications.
- Data administration.
- Data standards.
- ▶ Systems analysis.
- Hardware configurations.
- System security.
- Results of data exchange between McKinley County and the BLM.


From the President

Spring Meeting of NMGIC

The spring 1991 meeting of NMGIC featured two speakers plus exhibits by vendors of GIS and related technologies. A new program format was tried: a "coffee and danish hour" began at 8:00AM in the exhibits area allowing time for registering for the meeting and visiting the exhibits before the program started. At 9:00 the business portion of the meeting was held, followed by Earl Epstein's presentation on legal issues and GIS. This presentation posed interesting questions regarding liability and the use of GIS information. It stimulated several discussions revolving around this issue, bringing this important aspect to the attention of many GIS users. A lunch break in the exhibits area provided attendees another opportunity to visit the exhibits and enjoy a box lunch. The afternoon program featured Jim Avore's (US Census Bureau) presentation on the TIGER system. Mr. Avore introduced and explained the TIGER System development and concept. The TIGER Line files will be important coverages that will be used in many GISs thereby capturing the attention of the audience. A workshop on TIGER was announced, to be held during May. Committee meetings and a final visit to the exhibits completed the day's events.



Report from the Geographic Names Committee

Bob Julyan, Chairman

Washington Pass and Whiskey Creek highlighted the June 7 meeting of the NMGIC Geographic Names Committee.

Committee Chairman Bob Julyan reported he traveled to Tohatchi in April to meet with a teacher interested in renaming Washington Pass in the Chuska Mountains. While there he spoke to Tohatchi midschool students and teachers and met with the local representatives of the Navajo tribal government. The teacher is sincere and enthusiastic, but unfortunately she is not Navajo and her efforts are not coordinated with Navajo groups also concerned about the name change. Also unresolved is what to change the name to—Narbona Pass, Copper Pass (a translation of the Navajo name in common use), or something else. Julyan has forwarded the teacher's name change form to the U.S. Board on Geographic Names (USBGN); nothing remains now but to wait and see.

In Grant County, USGS has proposed that USBGN change the name of Rio de Arenas, a watercourse running south from Pinos Altos near Silver City, to Whiskey Creek, a name used in the nineteenth century and one the USGS found in interviews to be still used and preferred by local residents. Because this is a major and well known feature of the area, whose name has been somewhat controversial, Julyan sought the opinion of the Grant County commissioners. In a letter they recommended that no action be taken until a public opnion survey was taken. Julyan also wrote a letter to the local newspaper asking for public opinion. Though six of the nine responses did favor Whiskey Creek, the six hardly represented an overwhelming mandate, and the county commissioners appear to be correct in saying any action would be premature now. Furthermore, in 1912 a state law was passed formally changing the name from Whiskey Creek to Rio de Arenas and this law remains in effect. So the Geographic Names Committee recommended the USBGN defer this pending more information.

This committee did, however, recommend adoption of the following USGS proposals:

- ▶ Conner Creek. Change of application.
- ► Coyote Creek. Change of application.
- ▶ High Clark Draw and High Clark Spring. Should be Hy Clark, for Hyrum B. Clark, early homesteader who lived there.
- ▶ Little Burro Mountains. Change of application.
- ▶ Walnut Creek and Little Walnut Creek. Change of application.

The committee also voted to support the request of Harold G. Bassett to change the location of Tyrone in Grant County. Tyrone is a mining town; its former site is now a hole in the ground, and a new company town has been established in a new location but with the old name. The committee requested that something be put on the revised maps indicating the location of the former townsite; this would be an important part of the historical record.

And finally, Julyan reported the Picacho Hotel has been selected and a tentative agenda mapped out for the Western States Geographic Names Conference September 3-7 in Santa Fe. The agenda calls for the New Mexico Geographic Names Committee to meet on the afternoon of Wednesday, September 4. Julyan also asked committee members and NMGIC members to suggest possible topics for discussion at the conference, such as GIS, the TIGER files, rural addressing, and so forth.

Vermont Officials Sued (Source: GIS World, May 1991.)

State officials in Vermont face a lawsuit involving the states's GIS office and access to it. Stephen Whitaker, 34, alleges that officials have violated the state's public records and open meetings laws.

The suit names the state of Vermont, Administration



Secretary **Thomas** Menson, former deputy Administration Secretary Peter Bluhm and Office of GIS Director Bruce Westcott as defendents. The suit alleges that state officials have pursued a policy of charging for information in violation of Vermont's public records law, adopted that policy at the subcommitte level without a quorum at the meeting, denied Whitaker access to computer records that he claims would be available under the public records law, failed to keep adequate minutes of committee and subcommittee meetings designating the state's GIS office, and taken action at meetings held in violation of the open meetings law.

The lawsuit seeks unspecified monetary damages and injunction blocking purchase of a new computer. Whitaker has argued that plans to charge for GIS map access would limit use. He says he is worried that large real estate developers could afford access to valuable information, while a few citizens seeking to oppose a new devlopment would not. Menson and Bluhm both said they had tried to cooperate with Whitaker's requests for information and to participate meetings, but they Whitaker had been antagonistic.

Minutes of the Board Meeting

The board of NMGIC met on May 31, 1991 at the Technology Application Center. This was the first meeting with the newly elected members in attendance. Elections for officers were held: Tom Henderson was re-elected president, Dan Sutcliffe is vice-president, Mike Inglis continues as secretary and Amy Budge remains treasurer. NMGIC is a growing organization and is supported by a volunteer effort from its membership. To help "spread the work around" Tom proposed several committees within the board and asked for assistance from board members in leading these committees. The following committees were established and are chaired by these individuals:

A review of the spring meeting determined that it was an overall success and that the vendor exhibits should become an annual event. Also deemed successful was the opportunity to offer a box lunch in the exhibit area which the exhibitors liked very much. Discussion turned to the program for the fall meeting and when it should be held. The facility that has been used is becoming more popular and it is difficult to find available Fridays. The meetings coordinator will pursue this matter and report to the board on our options.

Also reviewed was the TIGER workshop which was held in May. This event drew about 90 participants and was free of charge. Consideration has been given to future workshops, specifically those sponsored by URISA. Tom suggested that we pursue holding a workshop on "GIS Management and Operations" in October. This is a URISA presentation and will cost some money. At this time no fee has been set.

The possibility of NMGIC becoming an affiliate of URISA was introduced last year. The board is waiting for URISA's response on such an association and has decided to explore the option further. There will more information on this matter in a future newsletter.

Ted Talmon gave a brief report on the status of GIS in state government. The GIS Advisory Committee and the Information Systems Division have been awarded a software and services price agreement with ESRI for 6 years. State agencies can purchase GIS hardware and software from the state negotiated price schedule.
